The proposed school, for which a building with class-

rooms designed exclusively for dyslexic children was fast nearing completion, would have five classes, from Class I to Class V. The idea was to have 15 to 20 students in each class, with spe-

educators handling classes.

Syllabus unchanged

Pointing out that CBSE was giving exemptions to such children, including alternative subjects and scribes to help write exams, Emanuel said the syllabus would be the same, but the teaching technique and approach would be different. The overall idea was to get these kids back to the mainstream. The school would be open to all, with a similar school to be opened in Bengaluru from 2019-2020, she said.
